## PROGRAM BOOK AND MEETING NOTES

### Meeting Rooms

Meeting rooms are located in four buildings, designated on the campus map by letters; these letters form part of the room number to identify the building in which the session will be held: **M**=Main Building; **L**=Law Faculty; **S**=Seminar Building; and **T**=Theology Building; e.g. “[L326]” is Law Faculty building, room 326. In a rapidly changing world, new contexts and forms of normativity widen the spectrum. The sociology of law should take such normative aspects into account, because they could have effects even on highly institutionalized traditional forms of legality and jurisdiction. The same is true for the text-book methods of legal reasoning which ground on the assumption of ideal conditions: From a purely analytical point of view they may be right; though in everyday judicial work legal methods are much more agile and judges are much more innovative when they develop their professional practice identity and when they face acute legal problems they have to solve. Legal practice at courts, carried out by judges, is certainly not the field where one

would expect normative innovation to take place. However, the plasticity of the normative and the flexibility of the norm practioners give fascinating examples of the alterability and the adjustability of at the same relatively stable institutions. The session brings empirical and theoretical works which address various dimensions in normative practice at legal courts.

Alexis de Toqueville praised jury service for its role in educating citizens about self-government. Yet until recently, the value of jury service in promoting deliberative democracy was no more than an untested theory. The only claim that supporters of the jury system could make was that jurors generally have more favorable views of the justice system. Fortunately, the Jury and Democracy Project is beginning to shed light on how jury service affects individuals' participation in the political and civic life of their communities. Research from this project has found that the act of deliberating as a juror resulted in increased political and civic engagement. These findings raise questions about the societal implications of jury service in the United States and in other common law countries. It also raises questions about the potential societal impact on those countries that have recently introduced jury trials and other forms of lay participation in the justice system.

The speakers will address the limitations of the legalistic and therapeutic narratives that truth commissions have employed to frame official memories of atrocity; the existence of a distinctive liberal narrative of transition which follows a particular genre; and the gendered nature of 'justice' in the transitional context. Speakers will draw upon the narratives of transitional justice in law, deliberations of truth commissions, literature and film, and consider the problems and questions that come up within the transitional justice project which aims to integrate personal notions of trauma, therapy and forgiveness with legal-political institutions. Among the issues that will be explored: (1) How can we think about the potential role of truth commissions investigations by considering how the documentation and recollection of past injustice, can expose the limitations of inherited narratives of justice, reconciliation and progress; (2) What can we learn from accounts that, for one reason or another, subvert the proposed transitional structure, such as stories of trauma, personal and collective; (3) in which manner are gender narratives often missing from or substantially compromised in the transitional justice fora, and what are the reasons for and forms of these silences, exclusions and compromised presences.

This session will center on the screening of a new hour-long film made by independent documentarist Anne Lewis (Assoc Dir., Harlan County, USA; Dir., Fast Food Women). The film is about globalization, viewed through the lens of a mountain community north of Knoxville, Tennessee. Dynamics examined include capital flight and plant closings; low-road economic development strategies pursued by local (now globally-linked) elites in both Tennessee and Mexico; migration from Mexico into "new destinations" in the Southeastern U.S.; local responses to the arrival of Latino newcomers in such destinations; labor organizing among immigrants working in a local poultry plant; and questions about how law relates to all of the above. The film includes footage from Tennessee and Mexico (both border maquiladora zones and interior migrant-sending communities), interviews with many kinds of workers and their families, and others with representatives of industry and the state. A law professor who has served as a close adviser and collaborator on this film since its inception over eight years ago will provide background about the film and its production. Commentators have been invited to comment on the film's politics and technique and on its potential strengths and weaknesses as an educational tool aimed at native-born working people in the U.S.

The theory of the European Economic Constitution, premised on the interdependence of the Rechtsstaat, the ordering of the European Economy, and the assignment of social policy to the nation states, has contributed to the decoupling of social policy from the European project (Christian Joerges, 2005). This roundtable explores the claim of Europe’s Left that the potential of the theory of the European Economic Constitution to guide the European project is exhausted and that the erosion of the economic constitution has not paved the way to ‘social Europe’ or to the reconstruction of a European social democracy. We examine Joerges’ claim that neither the open method of co-ordination nor the commitment to a “social market economy” in the Constitutional Treaty nor the new “social rights” provide a conceptually sufficient and politically credible basis for this end. In particular, the OMC threatens the very idea of constitutionalism, namely, the idea of law mediated, and rule of law bound governance.

The ICTY and ICTR, in their landmark decisions, recognized, for the first time, that rape and sexual violence are in them themselves crimes against humanity and instruments of genocide. Nevertheless, sexual violence and humiliation are common acts in war. The Universal Declaration of Human Rights states individuals have the right to life, liberty and security of person (art. 3), it prohibits slavery and servitude (art 4) torture or cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment (art 5). Yet systematic rape and genocide continue in Dalfur and elsewhere, there is growing evidence of the connection between participating in war and acts of domestic violence at home, and aid workers report women are given a choice of trading food for sex or starving. This session will focus on the relationship between gender and war. It will explore sexual violence as a weapon of war and genocide, the use of sexual slavery as a tool of war, the use of gender violence in military training and the relationship between war and gender based violence at home. It will also examine responses to these human rights violations through international courts and reconciliation procedures in post-war areas, as well as methods for address the psychological trauma that results from this violence.

**3134 Roundtable—The Future of “Separate but Equal” Across Race, Sex, and Sexual Orientation**

[Room S1.404]

This roundtable will critically explore how the long-maligned concept of “separate but equal” is faring both doctrinally and aspirationally in the 21st century. The legal concept was repudiated in the context of de jure segregated public education and other instances of express government-mandated segregation in the middle of the last century. However, in the contexts of both marriage and education, “separate but equal” is gaining currency as a politically palatable response to competing demands for resources and rights. Indeed, separate but “equal” has come to be not only accepted but also embraced by courts and political leaders looking to appease the equality demands of same-sex couples while acceding to the traditionalist demands to reserve marriage to heterosexuals. The concept is playing out differently in education, but with no less effect on the ground. Many who focus on closing the gaps in achievement between racial groups are now embracing often racially isolated specialized charter schools rather than integration efforts. Similarly, single-sex education, and special schools for gay, lesbian, bi-sexual and transgender teens are again ascendant. Perhaps most significantly, the United States Supreme Court is now considering whether to prohibit school districts from taking race into account in order to ensure that students experience education in a multi-racial setting. Bringing to bear tools from legal and educational theory and practice, this roundtable will address this central tension: the formal repudiation of “separate but equal”

as a legal concept, and its current embrace in several contexts by otherwise progressive constituencies.

This is particularly true for constitutional law, which in most countries cannot be amended as easily as ordinary law. Here much of the burden of adaptation is placed on constitutional courts or courts with constitutional jurisdiction and has to be achieved by way of interpretation. The panel will discuss how courts fulfil this function and how they ought to fulfil it in a manner faithful to the text and in accordance with democratic principles. The question has a methodological and a functional aspect: How can judges ascertain whether social change affects the meaning of constitutional provisions and what are the appropriate hermeneutic means to reinterpret the constitution? Which adaptations to changed circumstances can be achieved by judges, which are reserved to constitutional amendments? Special attention will be paid to new constitutional democracies.

Torture and the Security State

Over the 19th and 20th centuries, torture lost legitimacy as a penal or judicial practice, and was legally prohibited as an international crime after World War II. Nevertheless, it continued to be practiced with appalling regularity and prevalence, albeit practitioners tended to deny allegations because of its criminal status and illegitimacy. However, in the 21st century torture has been openly resurrected as a “legitimate” tactic for “fighting terrorism” and “enhancing security” by the US government, despite the denial-through-euphemisms such as “coercive interrogations” and “alternative tactics.” What makes 21<sup>st</sup> century torture distinctive and different from trends of the past is the fact that the world’s lone superpower, ostensibly a model for the rule of law, has refuted and abandoned a universal consensus on the illegality of brutalizing prisoners in custody, not to mention the substantial body of expert opinion that it is inefficacious in producing “truth.” The American embrace of torture after 9/11 has had a number of important and contradictory effects on a global scale, and these are the subjects of this panel. Revelations about American torture have galvanized and united an interesting array of critics within the country who are intent on reversing these trends, including uniformed military lawyers, human rights activists, civil libertarians and legal scholars. People in other countries who are committed to maintaining and enforcing the prohibition against torture have been appalled and propelled to action by the “green lighting” of torture by the US, which has been taken as a license for other states to openly adopt the same brutal tactics against their “enemies” and “subversives.” And scholars of torture have added to these global discussions by offering reminders and insights about the destructive effects on societies where torture was rampant in the past.

This mini-plenary will discuss the content of the European Social Model, its governance characteristics, and its implications for welfare, labor and employment policies, their development and implementation, in the world at large. Participants will focus on a series of critical, cross-cutting questions, including the role of the nation-state and of supranational institutions in providing welfare, in shaping and coordinating the labor market, and supporting or undermining industrial relations systems. Further topics include the role of non-state actors, particularly the employer and trade union social partners in the redesign and operation of these systems; the relationship between state welfare policies and the operation of the labor market; the race and gender segmentation of the labor market and its relationship to welfare policies on the one hand, and industrial relations institutions and employment policies on the other; the importance of welfare and employment policy in broader economic policy-making; and the role of supranational coordination and learning mechanisms as catalysts, pretexts, or re-channeling devices for national reforms in these intertwined and overlapping portions of Social Europe. The session will discuss factors that can explain the resilience of European welfare policies and explore the implications of efforts to sustain a European Social

Model in relation to reactions to globalization in the world at large. However, it will also problematize the common assertion that European social values are distinctive as well as broadly shared within EU Member States, as compared to other developed and developing countries.

**4129 Roundtable—Beyond the Teaching-Service Mission: Developing the Research Potential of Law School Clinics in the United States**

[Room L 144]

The modern clinical legal education movement in the United States has been animated by an explicit teaching and service mission. The synergy (and tension) of this dual mission has been the subject of considerable debate and discussion over the last four decades as law school clinics have become sites of increasingly diverse and innovative pedagogy and practice. At the same time, the U.S. legal services movement is at a crossroads. The access to justice gap for the poor has been well chronicled. Unfortunately, almost 40 years of government funding for legal services has yielded relatively few answers in terms of how best to serve clients, assess program effectiveness or understand client and community needs. We propose to explore the potential of law school clinics to serve as sites of inquiry and knowledge production. Clinics are uniquely situated to undertake a sustained and meaningful research agenda to answer critical questions confronting the legal services and access to justice community. Like good teaching hospitals, clinics should be sites for at least three, interrelated activities: 1) laboratories for testing service delivery models; 2) engines of teaching innovation, and 3) portals for substantive research. The roundtable session will describe and invite strategies for developing and advancing a research agenda relevant to legal services delivery policies and a more rigorous and empirical examination of the ways in which legal assistance does (or does not) produce benefits (“deliverables”)

**4130 Roundtable—Feminism, Restorative Justice, and Violence Against Women**

[Room S1.601]

There is an urgent need to create new ways for abused women to find justice. Despite significant accomplishments over the past 35 years, community activists know well that justice for most abused women remains elusive. Searching for ways to expand options for women and increase accountability for violent men, a number of feminist activists and scholars have been examining restorative justice. There are both potential benefits and potential harms in using restorative justice in cases of violence against women. At their best, the informal conflict-mediation practices referred to as “restorative justice” seek to decrease the role of the state in responding to crime, and increase the involvement of personal, familial, and community networks in repairing the harm caused by crime. As practiced in New Zealand, Australia, Canada, and the United States, restorative justice is most commonly applied to youth crimes. Restorative practices are not recommended, and in many jurisdictions are disallowed for cases of rape, domestic violence, and child sexual abuse. Nevertheless, there is increasing use of these practices to address violence against women. This roundtable will discuss the potential benefits and harms of using restorative justice in these cases, and will address what is at stake here for feminist antiviolence activism. Traditional models of legal education do not effectively address women's rights or explore how gender and the law interact with various social and political institutions. This failure reinforces gender-bias in all aspects of the legal system. The incorporation of gender into legal education, theory and doctrine can create a more inclusive legal culture that is responsive to the needs and priorities of women. #### 4232 Roundtable—Presidential Power in Context

[Room M 1070]

The "war on terror" has provoked — or in some cases, revived — a number of questions of constitutional doctrine, political science, and socio-legal scholarship. At a doctrinal level, we see renewed attention to Supreme Court cases addressing the Constitution's distribution of authority to respond to extraordinary situations. To political scientists, the questions typically concern the ways in which various institutional arrangements constrain — or fail to constrain — the political, ideological, and other agendas of the various actors involved. From a socio-legal perspective, the principal questions may be about the ways we talk about presidential power and the separation of powers more broadly — that is, about the factors that influence the shape of debates in this area, and about the ways in which attention to those factors reveals the highly contingent nature of those debates. This panel will draw on all of these perspectives to address fundamental and timely issues of presidential power. In particular, the panel will focus on a few central judicial precedents (including but not limited to national security cases) that have gained canonical status and that have come to organize the discourse, both within the executive branch and in the public more broadly, about the scope of the President's power. The panel will consider the particular social, political, and historical contexts out of which these decisions emerged, the process by which they came to be accorded canonical status, and the ways in which they have defined the contours of ongoing debates about presidential power.

Lori Andrews, author of *The Silent Assassin* (St. Martin's Press 2007), and Harriet Washington, author of *Medical Apartheid: The Dark History of Medical Experimentation on Black Americans From Colonial Times To The Present* (Double Day 2007), offer unflinching examinations of controversial narratives and practices involved with

**4429 Roundtable—Bringing the Nation-State Back In: Sovereignty and Identity, Law and Legitimacy**

[Room M Senatssaal]

1989 and its aftermath saw the emergence and swift consolidation of nation-states across Central and Eastern Europe. Moreover, secessionist nation-states – such as the Baltic states, Slovakia and Slovenia - were able to maintain territorial integrity, impose a monopoly on violence and establish the rule of law. Further still, despite war in the Balkans and the Caucasus, nation-state consolidation and border security remains the global and local agenda. This continuing primacy of the nation-state stands in contrast to the discourse on Europe as a post-national configuration. We hold that despite a lasting trend towards globalization, the law and legitimacy of the nation-state retains its overwhelming significance for democratization as well as marketization. Moreover, the sovereignty and identity of the nation-state remains pivotal in CEE as it did earlier in Greece, Spain and Portugal and does elsewhere in China and the newly industrialised countries of East Asia. The overall ambition of our round table is to bring the nation-state back in as a major object of study as well as the crucial factor for the restructuring of the European and global political, economic and social space. We seek to address a wide range of theoretical and empirical questions.

1. We undertake a historical re-examination of state-building and nation-building in Central and Eastern Europe during the 20th century to critically appraise arguments about the 'hollowing out' and 'withering away' of the nation-state as well as the relativization and complexification of sovereignty and identity. We question the increasingly assumed link between the nation-state and 'backwardness' by insisting that even globalization is embedded within nation-states. For our argument comparative cases are important and we identify as crucial to its salience Western European transitions from dictatorship to democracy and East Asian economic transformation.

2. We seek to re-appraise explanatory understandings of the transition in 1989 and the subsequent transformation, for we hold that indices of marketization and democratization make only sense on the presumption that a centralised state rules over a pacified territory. Hence it is methodologically mistaken to 'universally' plot and measure progress where and when historical and legal embeddedness matters most.

3. We hold that law and legitimacy and specifically the legal provisions for private property and public service are crucial. Specifically, we take a fresh look at the restitution of property and the privatisation of state assets. We are equally interested in a re-evaluation of public services as a complementary contract between the nation-state and the citizens.

The year 2007 will mark the 50th anniversary of the movie "12 Angry Men." This movie offers the only portrayal of an active jury in the history of American film-making. The movie has withstood the test of time, not only because of the great ensemble cast, but also because it portrays the jury as a group of twelve ordinary men who learn in the course of their deliberations what it means to be a jury. The learning process is not an easy one. The deliberations are marked by clashing personalities and marred by prejudice. Yet, the jurors, led by the persevering and patient Henry Fonda, eventually learn to put aside prejudice and personal enmity, to piece together the evidence with a critical eye, and to deliver a verdict of not-guilty based on their reasonable doubt. When this movie was released fifty years ago, audiences greeted it with little enthusiasm. Yet, the movie has endured and is now recognized as a classic. Even though the movie offers a fictional account, it provides a rare glimpse into jury deliberations. It continues to raise such questions as: Is this how a jury should deliberate? Is this fictional jury deliberation consistent with actual jury deliberations now that we have fifty years of empirical studies? **4530 Roundtable—Human Rights Law as Challenge for the “Cultures” of Different Disciplines**

In many different disciplines, researchers are studying human rights without much knowledge of each other’s research results. In addition to the valuable work conducted in subject areas such as law, anthropology or history, the research field of human rights requires close co-operation among different disciplinary backgrounds. Working in an interdisciplinary team can bring added value by detecting gaps and loop-holes in human rights. Such approaches are also important in figuring out the difficulties in implementing certain human rights laws or identifying unintended consequences of legislation. The discrepancy between ‘law on paper’ and ‘in reality’ becomes obvious through new perspectives put forward during an intensive disciplinary exchange. Understanding the context of the social reality of law is a precondition for the fruitful development of human rights law in theory and praxis. Still, interdisciplinary research is often seen as an excursion from the academic path and institutional and financial support for further research is rare. The aim of the roundtable is to elaborate on what is meant by the concept of interdisciplinarity in the field of legal and social sciences and to discuss the methodological and theoretical challenges posed by interdisciplinary team-work for the separate subject areas interested in human rights.

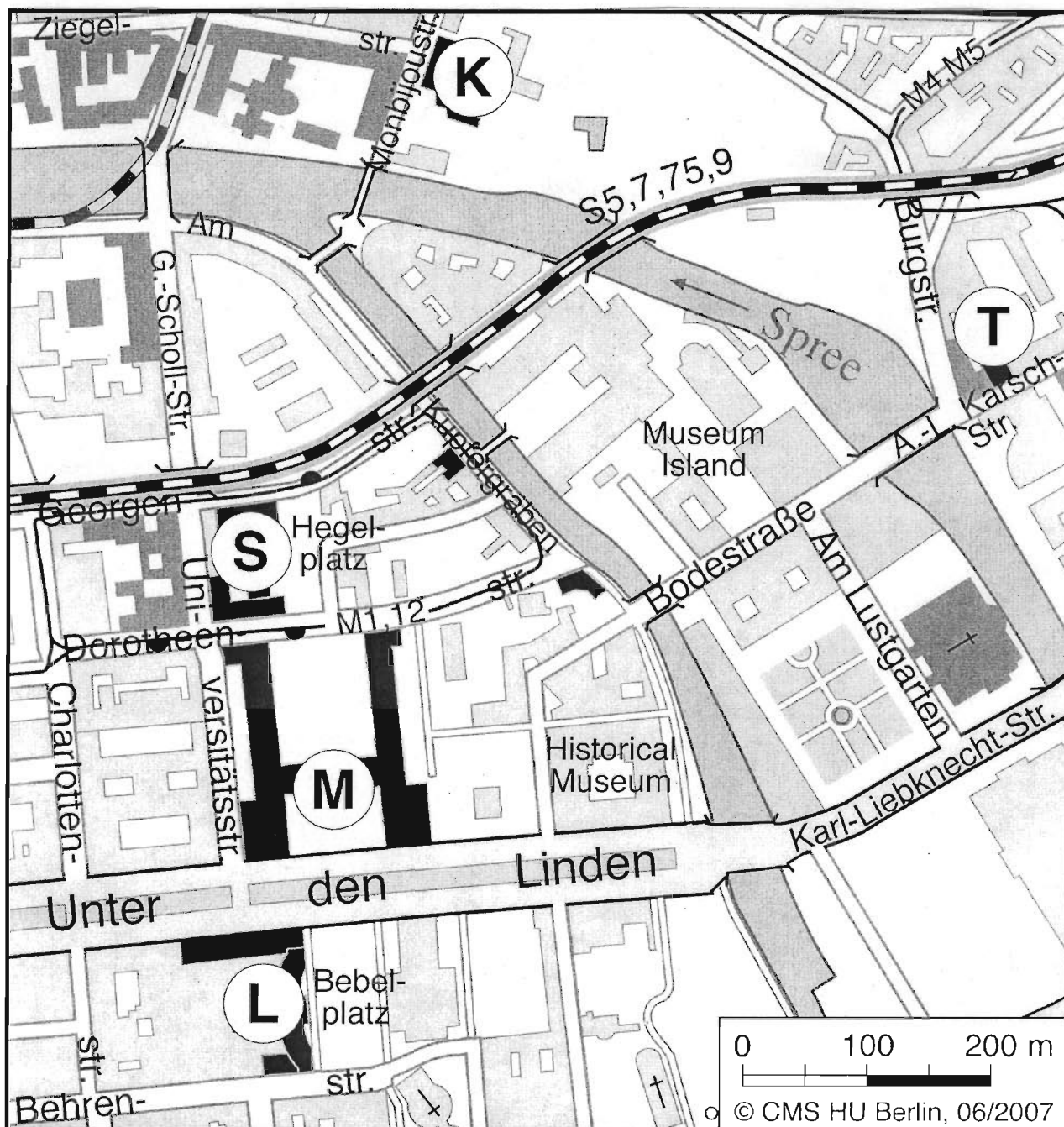
